If you have read them, you will note from the minutes of the April Management Committee meeting that there are still many projects under way at the club albeit that some are now complete. Also, you will note that we are compiling a review of various matters for general release to the members that wish to have more detailed knowledge of activity. This will be completed for the Summer.

In particular, Alan Davey is dealing with MSDC's latest request for further drawings on the improvement planned for the overflow car park as I conveniently fly to Spain and thus avoid any input. ON THE COURSE March / April

With below average and cool night time temperatures, growth has been very slow on the course this spring, particularly the greens, where we have seen little growth at all, leading to slower recovery from essential aeration and over seeding works. Slow grass growth and delayed germination is apparent on the new path matting works on the 3rd and 14th holes and on the newly seeded banks of the 9th tee areas also.

The delayed arrival of the contractor, not until March to start the 9th tee refurbishment, turned out to be very opportune. With large thirty ton diggers, way in excess of one hundred dumper

.....journeys to and fro across the 14th fairway to transport rootzone material and turf to the works, no damage at all was caused to the fairway, due to the exceptional dry weather. Unfortunately the same weather caused problems along the 2nd fairway again and the net had to be erected to catch balls at the bottom of the slope. I suppose you can't have your cake and eat it as the saying goes!

The 9th tee turf is taking well and we hope to play off the new tees as scheduled, sometime in June. If you have not seen the view from the extended white tee yet, dare I say, we have another signature hole view. At the rear of the newly refurbished 9th yellow tee, adjacent to the shed, we are creating a small natural seating area, I like to think of it, as a small oasis from the world of cars, concrete and computers. This area can be used on Captain/Gala days, other occasions, or just to sit, enjoy the vista and appreciate the wonderful habitat of Pyecombe Golf Club. The tree trunks and limbs utilized are all from recent clearance works on the 7th and 10th holes, so hopefully they have been put to good use, rather than burning them on the clubhouse fire. We hope members will use them and appreciate them for years to come. As with all greenwood projects, we should expect the timbers to, crack, denature and go grey as part of the degeneration process over time, pretty much like me!

For the first time this year we are experimenting with spraying an eight metre wide band of the rough, adjacent the semi, with a selective herbicide product called Rescue, on all holes on the course. This will be carried out when the rough starts actively growing, so as to be more effective. This treatment should kill the coarse rye grasses, whilst leaving other finer more favourable grasses and wild flowers alone to prosper. Coupled with our other practice of scarification this will hopefully leave us with a lighter, wispiest rough this summer. Ultimately weather conditions and temperatures dictate growth, but this intervention can only help. We will monitor the success of the treatment this year.

So, we look forward to some warmer weather, dare I say, much needed rain and subsequent improved course conditions as a result thereof.

VETERANS SECTION

The Vet's match season started with an internal match against the Broken Spur. The matches were against Highwoods on 30th March, lost 6 ½ to 1 ½, Worthing on 10th April, lost 6 to 2 (an improvement), the Dyke on 13th April, lost 6 to 2 (maintaining the improvement) and Copthorne on 22nd April, lost 7 1/2 to ½ (no comment except to thank Duncan Campbell and Chris Openshaw for the face-saving half). The most recent home match against Crowborough Beacon in May 1st resulted in our first win of the year by 4 ½ to 3 ½.

The internal competitions started with the final of the Harvey Frarey winter knockout between Ian Hawes and Graham Tate which was won by Graham on the 18th. The delayed Tam O'Shanter Cup from last November was won by James Easley who achieved 39 points using only 2 clubs and a putter – why do we carry so many clubs?

The Ladies/Vets stableford competition on April 14th saw a good turnout with 20 pairs taking to the field. The winners on countback with 37 points were Barbara Lawden and Tom Oliver, with Sarah Godfrey and Peter Gavin a close second.

The Vets Spring Texas Scramble on April 20th was notable for Alan Davies making a solo birdie on the 18th only to be outdone by Martin Avis's eagle, the winning team with a score of 56.7 were Chris Muschamp, Peter Ferns, Alf Bickham and Brian Chasser.

The Hole Tankards competition, a foursomes stableford on 27th April was won by Maurice Woolgar and Andy Ward. The monthly medal for April was also won by Andy Ward on a dreadful morning with 36 points, an excellent score on the day.

Finally, the Old Man's Medal – open of course to all Vets although some don't feel they should be qualified – was won by one who is certainly qualified. Ken Barnard brushed the rest of the field aside with a net 64 to win by 7 shots clear of Tom Nutley on 71 and Aubrey Watson on 72.
