Their commitment and golfing skill has taken us through to the quarter-finals of Division 1, Division 111 and the Morrice Foursomes – a brilliant achievement, very well played ladies. The first of the knock out rounds will be the Division III match at Ifield on Thursday 9th July and I wish them all good luck – play well and enjoy yourselves. Division 1 will play their quarters on the 23rd July and the Morrice Foursomes will be decided at the end of August.

Earlier in June the Ladies played the Summer Cup, reverting back to the original format of a 36 hole competition played over a weekend. No surprises on the results of the championship though - Aileen won for the 34th time, with a gross score of 149. Aileen is truly amazing. She won her first championship when she was 16 years old, and apart from the following year, has won it every year since! PYECOMBE GC LADIES' CHAMPIONSHIP

(Report sent to Press)

Competitors in the ladies' championship at Pyecombe on 30th June had to contend with very high temperatures and unpredictable bounces as the course is drying out fast.

The day was dominated by an outstanding performance by Aileen Greenfield, now aged 50 and entering her 'seniors' golf career. She won the championship this year for the 34th time, in a phenomenal demonstration of staying power. It's not that there are no likely contenders at Pyecombe, where there are at least seven other single-figure ladies. Captain Mary Barnard said in her tribute, "she is the best golfer Sussex has ever had".

Aileen, whose husband and elder son also play off similar low handicaps, was on the winning side at the County Championships last week when they won at Worthing. She was tied first (and lost in the play-off) in her first attempt at the England Seniors' Open at Broadstone, and she won the seniors' trophy in the county championship at Ifield, losing that championship only at the last hurdle to someone half her age.

ON THE COURSE May - June

With the new 9th Tee areas now in full use, the tee surfaces are excellent, the surrounding banks however, have had poor germination of the seed, due to weather conditions we are all aware of. These will probably have to be re seeded in Autumn, some growth is apparent, but we will have to bear an untidier appearance of those areas for the present than we would like.

The other area attracting much comment are the trial areas of rough on the 7th and 17th fairway bunkers, or as I call them "The Marmite Bunkers" it is love or hate here. They are a trial, we will monitor feedback through the Green Committee, which comprises Ladies and Vets Captains, Captain and Vice, new Pro, Head of Golf and Head Greenkeeper, so a good cross section of all sections of the club. We shall tweak them in due course to see if we can come up with something that improves the visual appearance of the course, but is not too penal a hazard. A final decision will then be made later on.

The new path matting to the 14th is being left as long as possible to establish, to give it the best possible chance of remaining in good condition, when we most need it in the winter months, again growth could have been better here, even though we have been fertilising and hand watering.

After various comment, criticism and suggestion about the course from a few members, I would like to make aware the existence of The PGC Course Management Policy Document. This document was formulated by a previous Chair of Green and the Head Greenkeeper. It was adopted by the club at Management Committee in 2003. The document describes the way the golf course is managed within the club rules and the greenkeeping standards and methods on which the maintenance and development of the course is based. It describes height of cuts for example to all areas, which order the greens are cut in. It is the parameters within which the Head Greenkeeper works in every area of the course. Most of the maintenance information in it was transferred

..... to the club website in my previous time in office, so it could be accessed by all who are interested. It can be found under the Course heading on the website toolbar, then, Maintenance FAQ.

I know we are all budding Head Greenkeepers, after all, cutting the back lawn and a twice yearly application of weed and feed gives us a far greater knowledge and insight into greenkeeping, than one of the most highly respected Head Greenkeepers in the area, who cut his teeth at Walton Heath, also an assessor for Plumpton College I might add and well into his third decade in the trade. Have a look at the FAQ section, it may be of interest, it may enlighten and explain why we do things the way we do out there.

And finally I thought I would talk rubbish. Aha I hear you say, you always do. Well rubbish bins actually. The boomerang argument about whether we need more bins on the course. I personally like to keep tee furniture, signage, bins, etc, to a minimum, as I prefer the natural uncluttered look. One of my favourite courses when touring is The Astbury, near Bridgenorth. A newish course 2011 I believe, boasts Darren Clarke and Sky's Sarah Stirk as ambassadors, and tops the review site tables for the West Midlands regularly. No tee furniture, no bins, no benches, not even ball washers, only a single finger oak yardage marker post and tee markers. What surprised me was that on four separate visits this year, I have never seen any litter at all on a course, which is generally packed to the gunwales and frequented almost exclusively by green fees and societies, no member section.

This would support the view that people, I believe, will act responsibly and take litter away with them. It also cuts greenkeepers time emptying rubbish bins, probably saves costs on generating larger amounts of rubbish for disposal, rubbish blowing around if the bin gets full premature and improves the aesthetic of the course. Whilst I think The Astbury policy is rather severe, I believe our present balance at PGC is probably about right. I rarely use the bins, tuck my litter, drinks bottle in my bag and dispose of it at home. I don't regard that as an inconvenience. Do we need more bins, maybe not!
